APPENDIX 4 – CATALOGUES

The British Museum and Sarawak Museum Collections

I provide catalogues here for both the British Museum and Sarawak Museum collections. These are to a very large extent parallel collections, although the British Museum collection is somewhat fuller than that at the Sarawak Museum. The items in the British Museum collection are numbered BM followed by the numbers 1-161 for simplicity and in order to distinguish clearly from the items in the Sarawak Museum collection. The British Museum accession numbers are also given for each item. The numbers of the items in the Sarawak Museum collection are those which I gave them in the documentation deposited with the collection at the Sarawak Museum in 1988, with the prefix `SM' to distinguish them from the items in the British Museum collection.

Except where stated otherwise, the makers of the items in the two collections lived in Pa' Dalih in 1986-88. Both used and new artefacts were bought for the two collections. Most of the new artefacts were commissioned. I have indicated in the catalogue where it was quite clear that items were either used or were new and had never been used.

Measurements are provided for most of the items in the British Museum collection but not for the items in the Sarawak Museum collection. This is because I was unfortunately not able to visit Sarawak to make measurements while writing this book. However, for most items in the Sarawak Museum

collection there is a parallel item in the British Museum collection, and the size of an item can be estimated from this.

Items in the British Museum collection

BM1

Belu'ing. Agricultural tool used for weeding. Iron part of tool made in the shape of an L, with the short arm bent over to form the blade and the other end fixed into a wooden handle, held in place with gutta percha (mat) and rattan binding around the handle. Iron part forged in the Highlands. Used.

Wooden handle with narrower wooden shaft set into it using gutta percha (*mat*) and rattan binding. Blade, with wooden support, fixed to shaft using rattan binding and `gunny' nylon. Used. Handle and shaft 1' 8½" long; blade 8½" long.

Handle and binding made by Bayah Ripuk (male) 1978. Blade inherited by Bayah Ripuk from his ancestors.

Materials: blade iron (belawan), handle wood (kayuh tara'); shaft wood (kayuh pul); binding rattan (ue pa'it). Inside binding part of 'gunny' (nylon bag for rice etc.).

Uai bara'. ('broad blade'). Axe used until approx 1966 for felling trees, still used for making

Handle made by Balang Pelaba (male) approx 1945. Blade made by Belong Elo (male) (Balang Pelaba's father) before 1920. Binding made by Balang Pelaba approx 1985. Handle and shaft 1'8" long; blade 7" long.

Materials: blade iron (*belawan*), shaft wood (*kayuh matah*); handle wood (*kayuh labakan*); binding rattan (*ue lengan*); additional binding deerskin (*kubir payo*); gutta percha (*mat*) used for fixing shaft to handle.

She was supposed to have made it herself, but girls do not make axes. Never used; ornamental.

Blade and handle made by Lawe Padan. Binding by Makio' Ulun (male).

Materials: blade iron (belawan), shaft wood (kayuh mata loang), handle wood (kayuh labakan). Binding rattan (ue lengan).

Tongol (bush knife) made of iron, wood (variety unknown), rattan binding (probably ue tak or

ue pa'it); gutta percha (mat) used for fixing blade in handle.

Attached to rattan binding by a nylon string decorated with beads is a gourd filled with spare blowpipe dart flights. Inside quiver are two squirrel skin pockets filled with blowpipe darts

(langan), with flights (ra'o), tipped with poison (parir) (see BM 11). Used.

Made by Lajan (male), Long Layu, Kerayan date unknown. Blowpipes were, in 1986-88, no longer made or used in the Kelabit Highlands because there are enough guns there, but were still made and used in the Kerayan.

Strips of rattan attached to centre with pieces of red cloth attached to them. Cap inside has cotton cloth around rim to make it more comfortable. Used.

Given to Pun Punang Kelapang of Pa' Dalih in 1987 by Simeon from the Ba Rian area, who

Bu'an. Large rigid basket for use in harvesting rice.

When they are bought, they have usually been made on commission to Kelabit living in town, who buy them as *bunga ruma'* (house decorations, to display in a prominent place). They fetch prices much higher than the materials or even the workmanship would appear to warrant. It is likely that they have a symbolic value, displaying Kelabit cultural heritage to non-Kelabit; there are a number of other articles which enjoy a similar position (see **BM116**). 4' 4" by 3' 2".

The handle of the tongol is also bound with rattan. The binan tongol is carved. There is a cord made of rattan and bark attached to the binan tongol for hanging the whole ensemble from the waist. This is standard equipment for any man entering the forest.

Tongol and binan tongol, as well as the rattan part of the waist string near the binan tongol, made

by Penan, who sold it to Sinah Pitan at her shop in Bario. Carving on *binan tongol* executed in Pa' Dalih Feb. 1988 by Kalib, Sabaan man from Long Banga' normally resident in the Kerayan but temporarily in Pa' Dalih working. *Labuh io* made by Bayah Ripuk (male), Feb. 1988. Agag bera. Sieve made of bamboo bound to rattan frame for sieving husked rice (bera). Made by Merua' Ulun (female) Remudu, 1986.

Materials: bamboo (bulu' poran), rattan for frame (ue kusah), rattan for binding (ue pa'it). Bought from Merua' Ulun, Remudu, 3/3/88 M\$8.

SM72

Lap. Fishing net used by women in streams and wet rice fields. Rounded rigid rectangular

creeper frame with bucket net made of bark string bound to it with bark string. Net used; frame new.

Net made by Na'an (female), Long Dano, 1984. Creeper frame applied by Balang Pelaba (male), Feb. 1988.

Materials: string made of bark (anit kayuh kilid) for net and binding, creeper for frame (uar bekar).

Obtained from Sinah Matala Ulun, Pa' Dalih 6/3/88 in exchange for a new *iap* made of shop-bought cotton string, bought from Pun Ribid Ayu, Long Dano 20/2/88 for M\$15.

SM73

Pukat. Fishing net, used by men in rivers. Stretched across the river and left to catch fish as they go by.

Made by Bayah Ripuk (male), 1987.

Materials: nylon string, rubber pieces, lead weights (all town-bought).

Bought from Bayah Ripuk 8/3/88 M\$20.

SM74

A'ab. Basket for storage and serving of food. Square at bottom, rounded at top. Made of bamboo bound to rattan frame. Ubir (SM102) has been applied to inside of basket make it proof against anything slipping through and to strengthen it.

Made by Sinah Matala Ulun (female), 1985. Rattan work by Balang Pelaba (male), Feb 1988. *Ubir* applied by Sinah Matala Ulun.

Materials: bamboo (bulu' poran), rattan for frame (ue kusah), rattan for binding (ue pa'it), ubir (SM102).

Bought from Sinah Matala Ulun 5/3/88 M\$7.50.

SM75

A'ab. Basket for storage and serving of food. Square at bottom, rounded at top. Made of bamboo bound to rattan frame. Ubir (SM102) has been applied to inside of basket make it proof against anything slipping through and to strengthen it. New.

Made by Sinah Matala Ulun (female), Feb 1988. Rattan work by Balang Pelaba (male), Feb 1988. *Ubir* applied by Sinah Matala Ulun.

Bakol tana'. Basket for transporting earth, open at one end. Handles at both sides for carrying. New.

Made by Balang Pelaba 3/3/88.

Materials: rattan (*ue kusah*) for basket and handles, frame made of creeper (*uar bekar*). Bought from Balang Pelaba 3/3/88 M\$10.

Commissioned.

SM77

A'ab. Basket for storage and serving of food. Square at bottom, rounded at top. Made of bamboo bound to rattan frame. Ubir (SM102) has been applied to inside of basket make it proof against anything slipping through and to strengthen it. Some of the bamboo strips painted with enamel paint before weaving to create a pattern. Used.

Made by relative of Sinah Doo Puun, date unknown.

Materials: bamboo (bulu' poran), rattan for frame (ue kusah), rattan for binding (ue pa'it), ubir (SM102) enamel paint from town.

Donated by Sinah Doo Puun 7/3/88.

SM78 and SM79

Bekang dela'ih. Expandable man's basket (literally 'man's bekang') with lining mat (liling) and shoulder straps (kela'e) used for transporting things between settlements, for carrying meat and provisions when on hunting trips, and for bringing in firewood. Constructed with flap at front attached only at bottom.

Made by Balang Pelaba (male), July 1987.

Materials: rattan (*ue lengan*, bound with *ue pa'it*), wood (*kayuh*; variety unknown). Shoulder straps rattan (*ue pa'it*). Lining mat (*liling*) grass (*da'un berpah*).

Bought from Balang Pelaba 31/1/88 M£25.

SM80 and SM81

Bekang dechur. Expandable lady's basket (literally 'lady's bekang') with lining mat (liling), headstrap (sengoloh) and shoulder straps (kela'e), used for transporting things between settlements. Constructed with flap at front attached at bottom. Back of closely woven rattan, with wooden piece at bottom, attached with rattan, to provide strength. Front and flap made of whole rattan twisted and intertwined into a pattern, within a frame of larger rattan. Coiled and intertwined rattan at bottom to form flattish base. Bark string at front to close basket tightly. Used.

Made by Ra'an Kerayan (male), 1970. Headstrap made by his wife, Malamud Ulun, Feb. 1988.

Materials: rattan (*ue rabun*, probably bound with *ue pa'it*), string made of bark (*anit kayuh kilid*), (variety unknown). Headstrap grass (*da'un tamar*). Lining mat grass (*da'un kabir*). Bought from Malamud Ulun 29/2/88 M\$50.

SM82 and SM83

Bekang anak dela'ih. Expandable small boy's basket (literally 'small boy's bekang') made of rattan with grass lining mat (liling) and shoulder straps (kela'e). Strip of split rattan to bind together at the front. Such baskets are used by small boys to transport personal possessions between settlements, to carry firewood and to carry meat and provisions when on hunting trips. New.

Made by Ketuan Aran (male), Remudu, Feb. 1988.

Materials: rattan (*ne kusah* and probably *ne pa'it* for shoulder straps), wood (variety unknown). Lining mat (*liling*) grass (*da'un berpah*).

Bought from Ketuan Aran 3/3/88 M\$12.

SM84

Uyut. Soft carrying basket made of rattan for personal possessions, with shoulder straps made of rattan. Used.

Made by Penan. Given by Pastor Remat (who is Penan), pastor of Pa' Dalih until 1987, to Balang Pelaba, Pa' Dalih.

Materials: rattan (ue tak).

Bought from Balang Pelaba 30/9/98 M\$7.

SM85

Uyut rawang. Soft loosely woven carrying basket made of basket for personal possessions, with shoulder straps made of rattan. Used.

Materials: rattan (ue tak). Cord for shoulder straps made of rattan (ue pa'it).

Made by Ketuan Bala (male), Batu Patong, 1984. String replaced by Riwed Bala, Feb. 1988.

Bought from Sinah Luun Ayu, Pa' Dalih, 11/2/88 M\$12.

SM86

Gawang barit. Soft carrying basket made of rattan with patterns (barit) woven in, fitted with shoulder straps.

Made by Penan of Long Beruang, Baram. Given by them to Raya Bala, Remudu, Feb. 1988.

Materials: rattan (ue tak). Natural black dye used to dye some strips of rattan (see section on materials).

Bought from Raya Bala 27/2/88 M\$20.

SM87

Bu'an. Rigid basket made of bamboo bound to rattan frame for carrying rice, both husked and unhusked. Fitted with headstrap (sengoloh) and shoulder straps (kela'e). Used.

Made by Pun Ngelipo Ra'an Lewan (female), 1984. Headstrap made by her. Rattan work by her husband, Belalong Tepun (male).

Materials: bamboo for basket (probably *bulu' poran*), rattan for frame (probably *ue kusah* and *ue pa'it*), rattan for binding (*ue pa'it*), rattan for cord (*ue koran*), grass for headstrap (*da'un tamar*).

Bought from Sinah Rang Bala, Batu Patong, 7/3/88 M\$30.

SM88

Kalang. Rigid open-weave basket made of bamboo for carrying fruit, roots, vegetables. Fitted with shoulder straps (kela'e) made of rattan attached with bark string. Used with liling mat inside for ease of packing and to prevent contents falling out through holes. Made using

criss-cross and parallel horizontal strips of split rattan. Used.

Made by Medang Aran (female), Long Peluan, 1985. Rattan binding by her husband, Tso Tepun.

Materials: rattan (ue kusah), bark for string (anit kayuh kilid), rattan for shoulder straps (ue pa'it).

Bought from Sinah Ellie, Pa' Dalih, Medang Aran's daughter in law, 6/3/88 M\$30

SM89

Ra'ing barit. Small rigid carrying basket made of bamboo bound to a rattan frame for harvesting and for gathering vegetables.. The strips of bamboo have been dyed using paint from town before weaving so that a pattern (barit) is created. Ubir (SM102) has been applied to inside of basket make it proof against anything slipping through and to strengthen it. Fitted with shoulder straps (kela'e) made of rattan, attached with string made of bark. Made by Mada (female), Binuang, Ba Rian, Kalimantan, Nov. 1987. Rattan work by her husband, Yus. Shoulder straps made by Nanad Bala (male), Remudu, Feb. 1988. Bark string made by Sinah Matala Ulun (female), Pa' Dalih, Feb. 1988.

Basket bought from Mada, Pa' Dalih, 29/2/88 M\$20. Shoulder straps bought from Nanad Bala, Feb. 1988 M\$2.50. Bark string donated by Sinah Matala Ulun.

SM90

Ra'ing. Small rigid carrying basket made of bamboo bound to a rattan frame for harvesting, gathering vegetables. Fitted with headstrap (sengoloh) made of grass. Used.

Made by Pun Ngelipo Ra'an Lewan 1982. Rattan work by her husband, Belalong Tepun. Headstrap made by Pun Ngelipo Ra'an Lewan.

Materials: bamboo (probably *bulu' poran*), rattan for frame (probably *ue kusah*), rattan for binding (probably *ue pa'it*), leaves for headstrap (*da'un tamar*).

Bought from Pun Ngelipo Ra'an Lewan 16/1/88 M\$15.

SM91

Bu'an barit kulit bodok Large rigid basket made of bamboo bound to a rattan frame for use in carrying husked and unhusked rice. Fitted with headstrap (sengoloh) made of grass and shoulders straps (kela'e) made of rattan. Pointed (bodok), then flattened, base, made in the

old Kelabit style. This basket will not stand up by itself. It is made of both stripped and unstripped bamboo (*kulit*, meaning 'bark', refers to the fact that on some of the bamboo this visible), in order to be able to create patterns (*barit*). *Ubir* (SM102) has been applied to inside of basket make it proof against anything slipping through and to strengthen it, but has adhered best to places where stripped bamboo has been in contact with it. Much of the *ubir* on places where the slippery outside part of the bamboo has been in contact with it has come off. *Barit* refers to patterns woven into bamboo work by using inside or outside of bamboo, whose names are, from top to bottom: *barit reko'* (crooked pattern), *barit bulan* (moon pattern), *barit peta'ud* (hooked pattern), *barit lua'* (*lua'* is the pre-Christian ceremony of anointing those going through transitions with blood), barit *kukud ada'* (spirits' feet pattern). Used.

Made by Parai (female), Batu Patong, 1972. Rattan work by Bala Ukung (male), 1972. Shoulder straps made by Balan Ukung (male), at unknown date, headstrap made by Na'an Tenan (female) at unknown date.

Materials: bamboo for basket (bulu' poran), rattan for frame (ue kusah), rattan for binding and base (ue pa'it), rattan for shoulder straps (ue pa'it), leaves for headstrap (da'un tamar), ubir (SM102).

SM92

Bu'an uang bodok. Large rigid basket with pointed (bodok), then flattened, base, made in the old Kelabit style, for use in harvesting rice. Will not stand up without support. Body made of strips of bamboo; uang refers to the fact that the slippery outside of the bamboo has been stripped off so that both the outside and the inside (uang) of the bamboo are visible. Fitted with headstrap (sengoloh) made of grass. No shoulder straps – to be carried on head only. Ubir (SM102) has been applied to both the inside and outside of basket make it proof against anything slipping through and to strengthen it. Used.

Made by Laba Awa (female), Long Dano, 1970s. Rattan work by Ngemong Raja (male), Long Dano 1986. *Ubir* (SM102) applied by Mengeh Aran (female) 1986.

Materials: bamboo for basket (bulu' poran), rattan for frame (ue kusah), rattan for binding (ue pa'it), grass for headstrap (da'un tamar).

Bought from Mengeh Aran, Pa' Dalih 19/2/88 M\$30.

SM93

Ra'ing. Small rigid carrying basket made of stripped bamboo bound to a rattan frame for

harvesting and gathering vegetables. Fitted with headstrap (sengoloh) made of grass. Coated

inside and out with *ubir* (SM102) to make it proof against anything slipping through and to

strengthen it. Used.

Made by Merua' Ulun (female), Remudu, 1986. Rattan work by her husband, Unid Tala

(male). Headstrap made by Merua' Ulun.

Materials: bamboo (bulu' poran), rattan for frame (probably ue kusah), rattan for binding

(probably *ue pa'it*), leaves for headstrap (*da'un tamar*).

Bought from Merua' Ulun, 3/3/88 M\$20.

SM94

Be'ong. Gourd on nylon string used to collect small fish, crabs and smails by women in wet

rice fields and streams. Worn around waist or on head. Used.

Made by Sinah Adun Rewat (female) 1970 approx.

Materials: gourd (bua' tabuh), nylon string.

Bought from Sinah Adun Rewat, 11/11/87 M\$1

SM95

Ugam berpah. Mat made of undyed berpah grass. Coarse grass; mats like these are made

quickly. Used to sit on. May be covered by finer tarub mats. Seed of payang tree (BM151) used

in making such mats.New.

Made by Doo Inan, Remudu (Kelabit settlement three hours' walk from Pa' Dalih) Feb 88.

Commissioned.

Materials: grass (da'un berpah).

Bought from Doo Inan, 3/3/88 M\$2.

SM96

Tarub kerubit barit. Grass mat with red and purple pattern (barit) woven in. Seed of payang tree

used in making such mats. New.

Made by Sarah, Ba Rian, Indonesia, Sep. 1987.

Materials: grass (da'un kerubit), tepang fruit (bua' tepang) for red dye, black and purple dyes

SM97

Tarub kerubit barit. Grass mat with red pattern (barit) woven in.

Made by Mariam Ribuh Paran (female), Long Layu, Kerayan, 1987.

Bought from Mariam Ribuh Paran in Pa' Dalih, 1/10/87 M\$12.

SM98

Tarub siar barit. Grass mat with pink, yellow and green pattern (barit) woven in.

Made by Sinah Ellie (female), 1987.

Materials: grass (da'un siar), dyes from town.

Bought at auction at 'cake party' (*pesta kek*) held to raise money for work on Pa' Dalih school electricity system (Sinah Ellie donated the mat to be auctioned), 22/10/87 M\$22.

SM99

Liling. Small grass mat for use inside bekang carrying basket.

Made by Pun Bian, Remudu, Feb. 1988.

Materials: grass (da'un berpah).

Bought from Pun Bian 3/3/88 M\$2.

SM100

Sample of bark from the *rababar* tree. Used for binding fences, tying back paddy stalks, making bird-scaring devices (*derur*), etc.

Collected by Bala Ukung (male), Pa' Dalih, 1988.

Materials: bark from rababar tree (anit kayuh rababar).

Bought from Bala Ukung 1/2/88 M\$0.50

SM101

Sample of *anit kayuh kilid*, the bark from the *kilid* tree. Bark used to make string (*nopar*) by twisting strands together (*ngopar*, literally 'to make string') on the thigh, for baskets of all

kinds, musical instruments, containers (see BM141). Now often replaced by nylon string

bought in town.

Collected by unidentified male.

Materials: bark from kilid tree (anit kayuh kilid).

Donated by Sinah Matala Ulun (female), Pa' Dalih, Feb. 1988.

SM102

Sample of *ubir*. Black paste used to strengthen and caulk inside of *ra'ing* and *bu'an* baskets,

a'ab containers and reno winnowing trays. It is made from the inside of the bark of the ubir

tree, which is scraped off, mixed with water and applied as a paste. This is then allowed to

dry in the sun.

Collected by Batang Ribuh (male), Remudu.

Fee paid to him for collecting M\$20.

SM103

Natang. Sample of resin from the *obong* tree. The resin from this tree is soft and was used

until the 1970s to glaze earthenware pots. It was used in the late 1980s to caulk the joins

between plank sides and dugout bottoms of boats (alud).

Collected by Kaz Janowski in the headwaters of the Di'it river (a source of the Baram in the

Kelabit Highlands) January 1988.

Donated by Kaz Janowski to the BM March 1988.

SM104

Sample of prah, pounded up old earthenware pot (tuning – SM37-45). Used mixed with fresh

clay to make new tuning.

Donated by Na'an Tenan (female), Pa' Dalih, Feb. 1988.
