Main research topics

- The relationship between humans and the natural environment through farming, hunting and gathering and the manipulation of the landscape (e.g. through moving earth and stone), and the social, economic and cosmological ramifications of that relationship.
- Beliefs about dragons and mythical snakes among different ethnic groups in Borneo, including tribal groups, Malays and Chinese, as these express cosmological beliefs about water.
- Oral literature as an expression of the relationship between people and the natural environment.
- The significance of the production and consumption of food in constructing human social relationships, through its role in structuring kin relations and including the role of food in structuring hierarchical relationships.
- Cosmological beliefs as these relate to the relationship of humans with the natural environment and the obtaining, processing and consumption of food.
- Food as a means of establishing and managing identity in the context of migration.

Research field areas

- Multiple sites in Borneo (Sarawak, Sabah and Kalimantan) as part of my research on beliefs about water spirits and the 'dragon' from 2017 onwards, beginning with the research fellowship I held at the Sarawak Museum (see above).

- The Kelabit Highlands in Sarawak (two years 1986-88 and many subsequent visits of between one and four months).
- Among Poles in the UK who left Poland as forced migrants, deported to Siberia and Kazakhstan in 1940 (1991 onwards, part-time and ongoing).

Museum work

I am currently SE Asia Curator at the University of Hull, in charge of the collection of more than 3000 artefacts made through the Centre for SE Asian Studies from 1975 onwards and of the Roy Bruton Museum at the University. Until 2003, the University of Hull was a major centre for SE Asian Studies and it was in this context that the collection was made. I am planning a series of themed small exhibitions in the library at the University, complementary to the Museum. The first such exhibition was in May-June 2023, with the title 'Heroines, Heroes and Cosmic Power in SE Asia'.

For a year, from 2017 to 2018, I held a research fellowship at the Sarawak Museum. I carried out research on beliefs about animals in indigenous cosmological systems, and particularly water spirits and the 'dragon', to feed into new galleries there. I also advised on the 'highlands' section of the new galleries. I continue (2023) to work with the Museum on the preparation of the new galleries, advising on an informal level.

I guest-curated the exhibition *The Cultured Rainforest* at the Cambridge Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology in Spring 2013, with Dr. Mark Elliott. This drew on the research project *The Cultured Rainforest* (see below) in the Kelabit Highlands in Sarawak (my field site for my Ph.D. in the late 80s and subsequently – see above), and included Kelabit artefacts from the Cambridge University collection and artefacts lent from my personal collection. I curated an exhibition with the same name at the Sarawak Museum from November 2014, which included an exhibition of the collection of nearly 200 Kelabit artefacts which I made in the late 1980s for the Sarawak Museum. The exhibitions included videos and the virtual visits of the Kelabit Highlands which I created in collaboration with Douglas Cape of z360 as part of the Cultured Rainforest Project. In 2016 I transferred part of this exhibition up to the Kelabit Highlands, Sarawak for display in the new community museum there.

I made two collections of Kelabit artefacts for the British Museum and the Sarawak Museum in1986-88. Catalogues for these are included in Janowski 2003a, which provides an exegesis of the objects collected.

As a student at the University of Sussex in 1972-6 I volunteered at the Brighton Museum and Art Gallery, helping to catalogue their collections.
